### THE TOWNSHIP COMMITTEE MEETING MINUTES (Edited Extracts)

The Township held its AGM and monthly meeting on Wednesday, 3 April. Township Meetings are open to anyone who would like to attend. The next meeting will be held on Wednesday, 1 May at 7:30 pm at the Community Centre.

Frank Crameri asked if anything had been decided about the walking track alongside Woolworths' supermarket or through adjacent private land. He added that Natasha Kukanja, the Community Strengthening Officer, had promised to set up a meeting to discuss this item together with other outstanding work that has to be done around the town.

Cr. Young said that an evaluation of the land was taking place but the effort to work out the cost had been somewhat tardy. The owner of the land wants the Shire Council to take full responsibility for the roadway across the land. Cr. Young said this project might or might not be in this year's Shire Council budget.

Philip Jackson, Strategic Planner Cardinia Shire Council, will attend the May meeting of the Township Committee to present the Koo Wee Rup Township Strategy Review.

### TOWNSHIP COMMITTEE MEETING MINUTES (Edited Extracts) (continued from Page 1)

The president, Gavin Brock, said he had spoken to a representative at the SES Crisis Centre about the promised "Flood Booklet". He had been informed that it is almost ready to leave the printer's premises. On Saturday, April 13th, the SES will deliver the booklet to all householders by a direct door knock. They will also leave spare copies at various places around the town.

Val Walker complained about the deteriorating state of the Town name sign on the approach road to Koo-Wee-Rup from Bayles. Cr. David Young said he will follow this up with the Shire Council officers and organise a replacement sign.

Cr. Young gave the meeting some information about the removal of the Railway House from Cochrane Park. He said that the Bayles Fauna Park committee had an "in principal agreement" with the Shire Council to a certain level of cost and the committee is keen to go ahead. Cr. Young said that there should be a positive outcome after the next Shire Council meeting.

Cr. Young said he will arrange a meeting between Charles Taveira, Manager Operations, Cardinia Shire Council, and George Fittock from the Koo-Wee-Rup Men's Shed, to discuss the requirements and training needed to comply with the Victorian Occupational Health and Safety Regulations for volunteers undertaking maintenance operations around the Town.

Actg.Sgt. Michael Jackson and Snr. Const. Steve Raciti of Koo-Wee-Rup Police presented the police report this evening. Actg. Sgt. Jackson said that it had been relatively quiet in Koo-Wee-Rup but there had been the theft of a trailer from the Koo-Wee-Rup cricket ground. Two people had been arrested for drug offences, one in Caldermeade and the other in Koo-Wee-Rup. There had been some graffiti daubed at St. John's and on the clock towers in Koo-Wee-Rup. He added that although the recognising tag on the graffiti suggested a known local person, that person now lives in Queensland.

Cr. Young noted the Shire Council's blitz program on graffiti. Offenders will be made to clean up any graffiti found around the Shire.

There was then some discussion about traffic gridlock in the town and Sybella Avenue during last weekend, Easter weekend. Actg. Sgt. Jackson said that fixing this traffic gridlock is somewhat beyond the powers of the police. He asked that anyone wanting to contact the police should ring Koo-Wee-Rup police station and the call will be automatically transferred to a duty officer's mobile phone or to Pakenham police station; or, in cases of emergency, ring triple zero.

Ray Brown asked if police could direct traffic away from Sybella Avenue during traffic gridlock at holiday times into Rossiter Road. This would help in unblocking the junction of Station Street and Rossiter Road. The answer was that doing this would create a further traffic problem at the junction of Rossiter Road and the South Gippsland Highway.

Cr. Young reported on the Shire Council Plan that is now on exhibition for public comment. The Budget for the Shire should be completed in about six to eight weeks, however the preview is already out for public comment.

He also commented about the complaints that had been made of the condition of many unmade roads in the Shire. The extended dry weather period over the past weeks has been the cause. The rain over recent days has seen the roads being graded successfully, holes filled in, and the roads brought back to a good condition.

The problem with the flooded hollow ground in Shelton Park is exacerbated by the land being of Aboriginal overlay and heritage. The council wants to fill in the hollow ground, he said. The original design of open excess water flow through the estate via artificial lakes and open drainage is now seen to be a problem and has possible water level issues at the outfall into the Rossiter Road drain.

Frank Worcester asked for action by the Shire on the amount of rubbish accumulating in the walkway between Grange Court and Icke Road. Is it possible to have a rubbish bin placed at the Icke Road end, he asked. Frank also alerted Cr. Young to the cracked concrete slabs within the same walkway.

Township President, Gavin Brock also commented on the gridlock of traffic in and around the town during the recent Easter break. He welcomed the coming bypass road and told the meeting that draft approval of the environmental report had been finalised by the Federal Government. A contractor for the construction of the bypass will be appointed in June/July 2013, and construction is due to commence later in the year. There was a further discussion on the effects of the bypass on endangered species such as the Southern Brown Bandicoot and the Growling Grass Frog. It was noted that the environmental report laid down provisions and rules for the continuing protection of species during construction and operation of the By-pass road.

Frank Worcester presented an overview of the Men's Shed activities. He told of their recent outing to Philip Island, calling in at the Vietnam Veteran's Museum on the way. Lunch was at the Philip Island RSL Sub-Branch premises and all had a good time.

He added more information on the forthcoming session that will look at requirements and training for volunteers undertaking maintenance operations around the Town in order to comply with the Victorian Occupational Health and Safety Regulations.

### TOWNSHIP COMMITTEE MEETING MINUTES (Edited Extracts) (from previous page)

Gavin Brock reported on a meeting with South East Water for an update on the joint sewerage scheme investigation being undertaken with South Gippsland Water. Gavin attended the meeting with Frank Crameri and Geoff Stokes.

South East Water, in partnership with the Stakeholder Reference group (SRG), will determine the preferred solution for an effective sewerage servicing strategy; this solution to be local treatment and local reuse. At the same time, South Gippsland Water has been working with the communities of Poowong, Loch and Nyora to provide backlog sewerage services in the area. This service will require a treatment plant and effluent reuse to be established. South Gippsland Water has purchased land at Hills Road, Nyora for this purpose. The three agreed medium list options will be further developed over the coming months. They are: -

**Option A:** Two treatment plants and an integrated Class C scheme.

This involves constructing two plants; a plant at Lang Lang to service Koo-Wee-Rup and Lang Lang and a plant at Nyora to service Poowong, Loch, and Nyora.

**Option B:** One treatment plant and an integrated Class C scheme.

This involves constructing one treatment plant at Lang Lang to service all five towns and establishing a combined recycled water reuse scheme. This scheme also includes recycled water storage at Hills Road, Nyora.

Option C: One treatment plant and an integrated Class A and Class C scheme.

Similar to Option B, Option C also involves constructing one treatment plant at Lang Lang to service Koo-Wee-Rup, Lang Lang, Poowong, Loch and Nyora. Class C recycled water would be supplied to agricultural reuse schemes in Lang Lang South. In addition, this option also allows the facility to be upgraded in the future to provide Class A recycled water.

Recommendations and a preferred strategic option will be presented to the South East Water and the South Gippsland Water Boards later in 2013.

Gavin noted that both Koo-Wee-Rup and Lang Lang plants were now 40 to 50 years old and nearing capacity. Already there were 12 to 14 expressions of interest for the uptake of Class C water from the new plant(s).

Sue Van Gaal asked about the state of the surface of the roadway at Sims Lane. It was difficult to go about business there, she said. Cr. Young said he would bring this problem to the attention of the relevant Shire engineers.

Ray Brown presented to the meeting a drawing of the proposed upgrade of the playground and landscape refurbishment in Alexandra Avenue. It is proposed to replace the existing swings with passive recreation equipment for younger children, together with a drinking fountain and new fencing. After some discussion, it was proposed by Ray Brown, and seconded by Joyce Light, that the design as shown on the current Landscape Plan be accepted. The motion was carried unanimously on a show of hands.

Caroline Roff protested about the avenue name -Alexandra. She stated it should really be Alexander as the avenue was originally named after Alexander Mickle.

Geoff Stokes said that there is a large dump of household furniture rubbish about 250 metres from the bus station towards Lake Sybella in the bushes on the south side of the walking track. Anthony Beckett added that there was also household rubbish dumped directly opposite this on the town side of the walking track. The secretary will write to the Shire Council and alert them of this eyesore.

It was asked if there could be a cover placed over the new gym equipment in Cochrane Park. This matter will be raised at the next meeting of the "Friends of Cochrane Park".

### COUNCIL SEEKS INPUT ON DRAFT KOO WEE RUP TOWNSHIP STRATEGY

Cardinia Shire Council's draft Koo Wee Rup township strategy is now on exhibition and is available for public comment until Friday 17 May.

The revised strategy will guide Koo Wee Rup's direction for the next 10 to 15 years in key areas including housing, business and economic development, transport, infrastructure, community services, heritage, urban design, recreation, and environment and open spaces.

"Council hopes many residents will take this opportunity to give their feedback on the framework, objectives and actions outlined in the township strategy," said Council's Strategic Planning Team Leader Steven Hines. "By commenting on the draft strategy, residents will be helping to shape the future of Koo Wee Rup. Their input will influence the character of the town and the vision for its future."

Residents can view the draft strategy and have their say at an open house event at Koo Wee Rup Community Complex on Thursday 2 May from 5.30pm to 8pm. The complex is located at Cochrane Park in Rossiter Road. Short presentations on the draft strategy will be made at 6pm and 7pm.





### **KOOWEERUP FIRE BRIGADE**

The KooWeeRup Fire Brigade wishes to thank the KooWeeRup RSL for the invitation to participate in the ANZAC day dawn service. We are proud to assist the RSL and to pay our respects to those who fought for what we have today.

As the fire restrictions have now been lifted we ask that you still take care doing burn offs and clearing rubbish. There have been a number of burn offs getting out of control in our surrounding areas and if you are concerned about a fire, please ring 000. If you are going to do a burn off we ask that you ring the Burn Off Notifications Hotline on 1800 668 511. By logging your burn off in the system, this will enable the 000 operators to have prior knowledge and can gain further information from the caller before paging the local brigade.

We have attended 12 calls in the last month ranging from burn offs out of control to house fires. As the weather turns

colder we recommend that you have your chimney cleaned to prevent a block up of soot causing chimney fires and that you remember not to put clothes to close to heaters. When clothes are too close they heat up to their combustion point and catch fire, this can either cause minor or major damage to your house.

Also, remember that children sitting too close to heaters can cause their clothing to catch fire and then cause significant burns to the child. It's surprising how many children's pyjamas are highly flammable.

We turned our clocks back two weeks ago and it was suggested that we change our smoke detector batteries at the same time. If you didn't manage to do this, we strongly recommend that you take the time to do so.

### LETTER TO THE EDITOR

On 19<sup>th</sup> April, my much loved Miniature Pinscher dog died an agonizing death from ingesting a 1080 bait that I understand had been laid on a nearby property to kill foxes.

My property is only <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> of a kilometre from a suburban housing estate in Koo Wee Rup and there are pet dogs and cats all around. I believe these baits should not be laid so close to housing.

It is well known that foxes frequently dig up a bait and carry it away, sometimes dropping some, and sometimes burying it elsewhere to dig it up again later.

So dogs can pick up some bait a considerable distance away from the bait station.

I strongly feel that NO animal, foxes included, should have to die such an agonizing death, as my poor little dog did. The authorities should look for a more humane method to kill foxes, and one with an antidote.

I have notified the Department of Primary Industry and I have been told that they, or one of their departments, will be doing an investigation which will take up to 2 months. I have been informed that the baits have been removed. Apparently there will be no compensation paid, even if fault is found with the procedure, to help me buy another pedigreed Miniature Pinscher.







### **MCDONALDS TRACK**

McDonalds Track originally went from the Tobin Yallock Bridge (where the South Gippsland Highway crosses the Lang Lang River) to Morwell, and it followed the ridges of the Strzelecki Ranges and was about seventy miles (about 110kms) in length. You can see the start of the track as it is the first turn-off into Lang Lang on the Highway coming from Koo-Wee-Rup, then it went to Nyora and Poowong. Remnants of the track are still named on maps, around Poowong East, Mount Worth (the highest point of the original track) then there is another section around Childers, Thorpdale and Narracan. McDonalds Track is not part of the Koo-Wee-Rup Swamp but I have always wondered what the origin was and who McDonald was, so I decided to do a bit of research.

The track was surveyed by Assistant-Surveyor George Thomas McDonald. He started in 1860 and it was finished in 1862. It was hoped that the track would provide an alternate route for stock to get from Gippsland to Melbourne. Once they got to Tobin Yallock they could then be shipped from Western Port Bay to Melbourne. *The Argus* of January 1, 1863 published a report by McDonald of his progress and he was very confident that *with the exception of a few places, a most excellent road may when cleared be had to Gipps Land … there are no creeks to cross, consequently no bridges will be required the ground is almost all good and firm, SO that travelling may be performed with safety and comfort at all seasons of the year. The cost of clearing will be the chief item of expenditure, but that, together with the expense of making a few side cuttings … should not exceed £10,000 pounds. Indeed for that sum I consider that thoroughly good road, one chain wide, could be made, which would be practical for travelling day or night. I specify a road one chain [20 metres] wide because the ridge for a large proportion of the distance would not admit of one wider, and in one or two places it cannot, without levelling, be made wider than forty-five or fifty feet [15 metres]. One of the greatest objections by the public to this road will be the scarcity of feed for stock but as the soil is generally good, I have little doubt that in the course of time hotel keepers along the road will clear and sow paddocks with grass for the accommodations of themselves and others.* 

In the end the track was never used, apparently due to the fact that there were no permanent water holes along the route. What else do we know about the Track? When McDonald created the track it was about seven foot (just over 2 metres) wide to Mount Worth and from there it 'narrowed considerably'. All supplies and equipment had to come from Cranbourne. The area was steep, heavily forested, some trees were 300 feet high (about 90 metres) and often the surveying party found that they were following minor ridges and had to back track to the major ridge. McDonald also reported that he had found coal seams along the track.

Sadly for McDonald his hopes of the route becoming a major road never eventuated and no hotel keepers ever came to provide accommodation and hospitality. It was about 1874 that settlers began selecting land along the McDonalds Track around Poowong, and, by then, the reports were that the track was completely overgrown. Later settlers branched out from there to Poowong East and Poowong North. This area was also opened up by the establishment of a coach track from Poowong to Drouin after the Gippsland Railway was opened in 1878. The other local effect the Track had was the establishment of the township of Tobin Yallock.

The first store and hotel were built c.1867 by William Lyall (who owned Harewood) and located on part of the *Tobin Yallock* (or *Torbinurruck*) squatting run on the junction of McDonald's Track and the South Gippsland Highway. This store and hotel became the nucleus of the town of Lang Lang, as it was officially known, though the locals called it Tobin Yallock. Tobin Yallock would eventually have a church, a Post Office, Mechanics' Institute and other stores. Its decline began with the coming of the railway when the station, called Carrington (later known as Lang Lang), was built east of Tobin Yallock, in February 1890. By about 1894 most of the businesses and public buildings had transferred to the new Lang Lang based around the railway station.

What do we know of George Thomas McDonald? He came from Dumfries in Scotland and arrived in Victoria in 1853. According to the *State Government Gazette* he was employed in the Lands and Survey Office in August 1857 and was there until about 1879. On November 24, 1869 he married Amelia Margaret Mitchell. He was listed in the marriage notice in *The Argus* as the District surveyor, Castlemaine District. Amelia was listed as the second daughter of the Hon W.H.F Mitchell. Sir William Mitchell was President of the Legislative Council. They had eight children - the first being Isabel who was born in 1871, then four more were born in Victoria up to 1878; then three were born in Queensland from 1880 to 1885. In spite of giving birth to eight children in 14 years, Amelia lived to the ripe old age of 95 and died in Brisbane in 1939. George McDonald died on February 3, 1915 aged 79. His death notice listed his address as 'late of Rocklea and Gladstone districts'.
