


Letting the 'yip run free

The bridge was demolished as it was no longer used for rail operations and was in a dilapidated and unstable state, meaning it was not feasible to repair or rebuild it.

Forget Me Not Cafe was again well attended. The attendees heard a very informative talk from trainee Occupational Therapist, Lilli, who operates out of the KRHS. There has been more COVID through the KRHS site, so no residents were able to attend the cafe this time.

Smoke Alarm Installation Program

CFA has a free Smoke Alarm Installation Program happening where suitably trained volunteers will come to your house, do a survey on what smoke alarms you currently have installed, give you a few tips and information on the care of your alarms and then, if needed install new alarms.

As all alarms have a 10-year service life, all alarms should be replaced if they are more than 10-years old, batteries should be replaced regularly and they should be tested monthly.

The new smoke alarms installed by CFA have a lithium 10-year battery in them so they don't need changing but the whole alarm should be replaced after 10 years.


News from the Consumer Advisory Committee.

At the same time, we will have a guest speaker to talk to us about relevant problems or highlights of the KRHS system and the wider world of the South Gippsland area system.

Now, to our friends and neighbours in Koo-Wee-Rup and District. remember, any of our Committee members will be available to help you if you want to communicate with the Koo-Wee-Rup Regional Health Service Board of Management problems that could be upsetting you, as a patient, a resident or a carer, and also, maybe, as an individual Koo-Wee-Rup resident or, indeed, from the whole community's point of view. Any Community Advisory Committee member will listen to you closely and acknowledge your concerns, so that any problem you may have is understood and seriously considered. We are your best advocates always. Further to that please have a serious thought about you, joining us as a committee member; your thoughts and opinions of these subjects would help us a lot so do have a go Also, if you as a consumer/customer, have a suggestion or some nagging thoughts about your difficulties, or your dependant's comforts or problems with any aspect of the KHRS, then get in touch with the KHRS CAC. 

Cardinia Shire Council endorsed the detailed design for stage 1 of the Pakenham Revitalisation Project at the June 2024 Council Meeting, following extensive community consultation.

Stage 1 works will see upgrades take place along Main Street, Pakenham, from the railway line to the John Street intersection, which will transform the town centre to encourage more people to stay longer and spend local. The project aims to increase outdoor dining opportunities, create safe pedestrian and cyclist movement, and provide more spaces for events and activities.

The plans include the following upgrades and changes to Main Street, Pakenham:

- Wider, more accessible footpaths
- Two-way road with new pavement and kerb and channel
- 28 parallel parking bays
- 9 raised pedestrian crossings
- 24 trees
- 22 seats
- 107 pedestrian safe bollards
- 20 light poles with feature lighting display
- 4 bike racks
- 22 bins
- New accessible drinking fountain with drinking bowl for dogs
- Yakkerboo statue to remain at the heart of Main Street
- Numerous garden beds
- Speed limit change from 50km/h to 40km/h

The finalised plans mark a major milestone for the project, which will pave the way towards building a vibrant precinct that will benefit all those who live and work in Pakenham and greater surrounds.

Key features include the widening of footpaths to encourage street activation and enhance safety. The required shift to parallel parking will enable pedestrian safety a nd encourage activation. Other elements include the design of the street, furniture, the future of the street trees and the construction of a lighting display that will act as a precinct-marker.

The speed limit will be lowered from 50km/h to 40km/h, which will result in enhanced safety for both pedestrians and commuters. The reduction will support a more enjoyable space to walk, cycle and socialise.

Cardinia Shire Mayor Councillor Jack Kowarzik said the design considers diverse demographics within Pakenham and will create a vibrant, active and safe town centre that is accessible and welcoming for everyone.

"Pakenham has changed dramatically over recent time, but our town centre has been left behind. Our community has been calling for an uplift in the look and feel of central Pakenham, and as someone who grew up in the area, I'm really pleased to see serious investment go toward improving Pakenham for people first and foremost."

"Design features aim to improve accessibility, safety, functionality and to provide for a flexible Main Street that encourages the growth of a night-time economy, through the opportunity to host events and festivals," Cr Kowarzik said.

"The functional design will encourage walkability and access to and from key destinations, such as the community hospital, train station, walking to the PB Ronald Reserve, and activation of the wider precinct."

Broadly, these works will support ongoing development in the precinct over the next decade, including the Pakenham train station, the development of a community hospital, further revitalisation works in the surrounding streets and the creation of additional car parking.

Council will complete less-invasive set-up and preliminary works from September to December 2024, before the peak Christmas period to minimise disruptions to local business. It is expected that more involved works will start from January 2025, conditions permitting.

A warm, safe Cardinia Shire for all seniors

Cardinia Shire Council and community came together to raise elder abuse awareness through the Warm Safe Home project in the lead up to World Elder Abuse Awareness Day, celebrated annually on 15 June.

The Warm Safe Home project, led by Seniors Rights Victoria (SRV), Council on the Ageing (COTA) Victoria, and Housing for the Aged (HAAG) encouraged organisations and community groups to create small-scale model houses that represent what a warm, safe home means to them.

The project aims to raise awareness of elder abuse, housing affordability, and other issues that face seniors across Victoria, and focuses on increasing and improving awareness of the rights of everyone to a warm safe home, free from elder abuse.

As part of the project, Cardinia Shire Council facilitated workshops, including a community event with the Pakenham Senior Citizens Centre, where participants discussed elder abuse, including recognising signs, promoting awareness, and emphasising the right to a safe home.

Each of the houses built include a message about what a warm safe home means to the creator, including for example, what made them feel safe and loved at their grandparents' homes and what brings them happiness in the

grandparents' homes and what brings them happiness in their own homes.

Cardinia Shire Mayor Councillor Jack Kowarzik said Council was proud to facilitate local participation in this event, emphasising the collective role of Council and community in creating a safe community for all, especially for vulnerable seniors.

"Supporting World Elder Abuse Awareness Day each year is part of Council's demonstrated commitment to supporting vulnerable seniors and promoting their wellbeing within Cardinia Shire," Mayor Kowarzik said.

"As an Age-Friendly Community, we recognise that community safety for all is a shared responsibility. We must work together to give seniors a voice, be prepared to listen, advocate for their needs, and support them to live healthy and fulfilling lives within a safe Cardinia Shire.

Elder abuse can take many forms and it is usually committed by someone familiar to the victim, with two thirds of abusers being an adult child. Abuse may be physical or come in the forms of financial, emotional, psychological, sexual, or social harm. Additionally, the severity of the abuse can vary and it may be an isolated event or ongoing.

"The unfortunate reality for some older people in the community, is that they cannot feel safe or supported in their own homes, within their families or out in their community," the Mayor explained.

"Safeguarding our seniors from elder abuse is crucially a collective role of governments and community. Addressing factors that contribute to the problem, such as working to ensure affordable housing options are available, particularly for vulnerable people, and creating awareness about elder abuse, how it happens, and what support is available – it all helps.

"By participating in and supporting WEAAD each year, and working to increase affordable housing availability within Cardinia Shire, we are creating awareness and improved conditions for our local seniors to speak out, avoid or leave situations where they are vulnerable to elder abuse."

The old ANZ Bank Building in Koo Wee Rup

Banking in Koo Wee Rup started in 1905 when an agency of the London Bank at Garfield was established in the town. In 1920, the London Bank amalgamated with the English, Scottish & Australian Bank (E.S. & A Bank) who in turn

amalgamated with the ANZ in 1970.

The Garfield agency of the London Bank was established in July 1904 and it was converted to a full Branch a year later and the first manager was Clarence Adeney. So successful was the Garfield Branch that the Koo Wee Rup agency was established in August 1905 and the next year agencies at Yannathan, Iona and Tynong. By September 1906, the Koo Wee Rup agency was also successful enough to be converted into a full Branch, and the Garfield manager, Clarence Adeney, was placed in charge and he was in charge until 1920. A Branch, as opposed to an Agency, had full-time operating hours and its own manager.

Also in 1906, Banking Chambers were constructed in Station Street, as the Lang Lang Guardian reported in September-

Mr A. Woodman had accepted a contract from the London Bank of Australia Ltd to erect a Bank chambers and Dwelling at an estimated cost of £600. The construction is to be of oregon and plaster and it is also proposed to use tiles for the roof.

Another report of the new building was in the South Bourke & Mornington Journal -

The authorities of the London Bank Australia have decided to erect a bank here, and to that end plans and specifications have been prepared by a Melbourne firm of architects. It is estimated that the structure will cost between £600 and £700, and will be an undoubted acquisition to the district.

In October 1912, the London Bank purchased the site of their Mornington Journal.

building for a satisfactory price as noted by the South Bourke & Advertisement from the South Bourke & Mornington Journal, August 16, 1905 On October 22, 1917, around 10.00 am there was a tragic accident at the branch when 25 year-old William Lees McClure, the Bank clerk at Koo Wee Rup was shot. The Bank's loaded revolver had been on the counter, William removed it from the counter and placed it on a stool and when opening the cash drawer had accidently knocked the gun off the stool, it hit the ground and exploded, and a bullet entered his groin. He was taken to Nurse Campbell's Private Hospital in Dandenong, operated on, however the wound became septic and he died on November 6. Evidence was given at the Inquest by Mr Adeney, who said it was usual for me to place the automatic pistol in the counter, there was also another revolver for the use of the bank officials. William was the son of William Lees McClure and his wife Catherine (nee Hallinan) of Clericote, Springvale; he had a sister Florrie and a brother, Tom. William was buried at the Cheltenham Pioneer Cemetery. The Inquest determined the incident was an accident. It was a senseless death and as William's father noted in his evidence - My son left my home at Springvale at 6.45 am in good health and spirits, and he had no financial or other troubles. In 1919, the original building was expanded, by building out to the footpath and adding a second storey. The architects for the renovations were Oakden, Ballantyne and Hare. In October of 1919, the Koo Wee Rup Sun reported that - The contractor for the alterations to the London Bank at Koo-Wee-Rup has the work well in hand and will complete it in a few weeks. It speaks well for Koo-Wee-Rup when the local bank has to enlarge its premises. The extra room will be needed in anticipation for the next record season.


In December, the Koo Wee Rup Sun could report on the finished building - Bank Improvements

Another exemplification as to the soundness of this district has been shown by the London Bank of Australia, for this financial Institution has had big alterations carried out in their Kooweerup premises, and tenders were recently called for the erection of another building at Dalmore. For some time past the officials have been hampered in their work by the want of more room, and this, coupled with the fact that no banking company indulges in any expenditure unless fully assured that the possibilities ahead are of the best, it is a good guarantee as to the potentialities of the swamp area.

The alterations carried out consist of more room being made for the conduct of general business, a manager's office, and rooms upstairs to be used as residential quarters. The work has taken longer to carry out, than anticipated, owing to labour troubles, strikes and railway delay, but despite all these inconveniences the contractor has performed his task in a quick and thorough manner, and has earned the appreciation of the authorities in Melbourne.

The ceilings are made of picton fibre panels and moulded, and the plastering of the walls have been neatly done. New office fittings have been provided, the timber used being Queensland maple, nicely finished with french polish. A new strong room has also been erected and the building renovated throughout.

During all this time Clarence Adeney was the

Manager. Described in one report as the *genial Mr Adeney* and described by David Mickle as *a kind and gentle man*, he left the manager's position at Koo Wee Rup in early 1920 and was replaced by William Kerr Paterson, whose wife Margaret was to become the inaugural President of the Koo Wee Rup CWA when it was established in 1929. Clarence then took up the part-time position operating the Yannathan bank. In January 1923 *The Argus* reported that -

Mr. C. Adeney, J.P., of Yannathan, has been granted extended leave of absence from the E. S. and A. Bank on account of ill health. During the last 22 years Mr. Adeney managed a number of branches of the London Bank (now the English, Scottish, and Australian Bank). He has been intimately associated with the development of the closer settlement areas, more particularly the Koo-wee-rup swamp.

Clarence Adeney was born in 1869 to Henry William Howells Adeney and his wife Sarah (nee Pitman). His father was an Anglican Minister and his mother, as a matter of interest, was the niece of Sir Isaac Pitman, who invented Pitman shorthand system. Clarence married Angelina Treweek in 1895 and they had four children - Arnold (1901 in Maryborough), Henry Allen (1903 Warragul), Dorothy (1905 Warragul), Marjorie (1906 Garfield). Clarence died aged 79 on July 10, 1948; a year after Angelina who died July 24, 1947.

The Cardinia Shire Heritage Study describes the Koo Wee Rup Bank as an early example of the architectural style known as *towards modernism* and it is one of three former E.S. & A Banks in the Heritage Study. The other ones are the Garfield Bank, which was built in 1931 and the Lang Lang Bank, which was built in 1929.

The ANZ closed the Koo Wee Rup Bank in May 2016, and the building is currently occupied by a Pharmacy.
