#### **Bowls Clubhouse Redevelopment**



The Bowls clubhouse redevelopment is well under way. The old clubhouse is gone, and groundwork nearly completed. Most of the building is being fabricated offsite, so not weather dependent, and it is anticipated that the new clubhouse should be complete by October in time for the start of the next season.

#### **Koo Wee Rup Township Committee Meeting**

The Township held its monthly meeting on Wednesday, 1 May at the KWR Community Centre. The next meeting will be held on Wednesday, 5 June at 7:30 pm at the KWR Community Centre. Everyone is welcome to attend Township Meetings and join in the discussion.

Questions to Councillor Cameron

Why is Emerald Community House losing its funding?

It was a controversial decision; Councillor Cameron did not have the details to hand and referred the questioner to council staff for more details. The Community House auspices a lot of smaller groups, so this decision will have a wider impact than just the Community House.

Is there a rate rise in the council budget?

Statewide rise of of 1.7%, but can impact some areas more than others as the 1.7% is the average across the shire.

Council is running a naming competition for the new Pakenham East suburb. The Naming Authority have specified that the suburb should be named after a woman with connections to the area. Five names have been nominated. The nominations can be viewed on the council Your Say page and you can lodge your vote for your preference.

Caroline has received reports again regarding hazardous areas for wheelchair users in Koo Wee Rup. These include the ramps at the pedestrian crossing outside the bakery which is too steep. Is there a body that this can be referred to that can provide input and recommendations that can be taken to council? Advice from the meeting was that the National Code states that the slope should be 1 in 14, the ramp is steeper than this, but council have not been able to find a solution that will fit within the constraints of the site. This ramp is at the only controlled pedestrian crossing in town. Caroline will contact Jordan Crugnale's office for advice.

#### 10 years ago in The Blackfish

I was browsing old Blackfish recently and came across this little gem. You may remember that the Australian Human Rights Commission had hosted an expensive event in Sydney and when criticised by the media, Gillian Triggs, then President of the Commission, asserted that they couldn't hold such a prestigious event in 'a village hall in Koo Wee Rup'. To her credit, she accepted an invitation from the Township Committee to visit our village hall.

# Australian Human Rights Commission President Visits "Village Hall" in Koo Wee Rup

Professor Gillian Triggs, President of the Australian Human Rights Commission, visited Koo Wee Rup last month and spoke to a group of residents at the Community Centre. She apologised for any concern that had been caused to the local community by comments attributed to her implying that an event held in a village hall in Koo Wee Rup was somehow second rate.

She went on to explain the work that the Australian Human Rights Commission undertakes. Although a lot of the work reported in the media is about the work they do in the international sphere, particularly in relation to asylum seekers; the Commission is tasked to investigate and prosecute every case of alleged discrimination on the basis of race, age, sex, religion, etc in Australia.

She told the group that the media furore caused by the Koo Wee Rup comments had caused the Commission to address their Sydney-centric attitude and encouraged them to look at more regularly hosting events in Regional Australia.

Often it is the same exercises your Physio has set for your recovery, but by doing them in a supportive setting with like-minded people, it becomes more easily, a part of our daily routine and that what we need.


Human nature is such that we tend to stop our preventative exercises once the initial acute phase is over. Chair Pilates is yet another way to do some good core engagement work, which will strengthen our backs and support the body with daily functional activities. Also, the resistance work, maintains muscle strength and we all need good balance to enable self-correcting when we are at risk of a fall. So, all the boxes are ticked.

Some participants who have lacked confidence, then continue onto mat classes, and others who have issues, can reduce and go from a mat class to a chair class. All positive options.

Your first class is FREE so why not give it a go. Cost then is \$5 per half hour session for chair and \$10 for a 50 minute mat class.

#### Koo Wee Rup Township Committee Meeting continued from front page

The Hospital Community Advisory Committee met recently, and the main discussion was around the star rating given to the facility by the Government. It is based mostly around safety and quality of care.

Koo Wee Rup Swamp Tower – the state of the entry/exit to the carpark is dangerous, many potholes meaning that vehicles have to slow dramatically to enter safely and cannot easily pull out onto the highway. Should be reported to the VicRoads as they are responsible for managing the South Gippsland Highway.

The meeting heard a brief introduction from several new or first time attendees at the Township Committee meeting and they were all warmly welcomed.

Can the signs promoting the introduction of reticulated natural gas to Koo Wee Rup be removed? It has been many years since this project was implemented. The answer is yes, just take the right tools and take them down.

There is a new bus stop being constructed on the Koo Wee Rup – Pakenham Road at Greenhills Road but Westernport Buslines don't know about it. When enquiries were made at Public Transport Victoria they said to speak to Westernport. Garry has asked that the route be expanded to detour into the industrial estate, he has spoken to Jordan Crugnale and she will follow up.

The Cardinia Access and Inclusion Advisory Committee met recently. They are working to make sure that council assets and facilities are accessible for all. There was an allowance of \$240,000 in the last budget, no commitment in the new budget. This budget funded several projects in Koo Wee Rup including Accessible Toilets at the Swimming pool and the lift and ramp to allow all abilities access to the pool. Kaye said there had been many comments regarding this omission from the new budget. Garry will draft an email to be sent to council.

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#### Police Report to Koo Wee Rup Township Committee

Sergeant Kevin Isles attended this evening's meeting.

April Crime statisics:

- Family Violence is more prevalent because the town is growing. 6 incidents attended this month, which can take up to 4 hours or more for the attending officers.
- Stolen cars in the wider area (includes Cardinia Shire). 3 thefts reported. Unfortunately, vehicles left unlocked or keys in cars. Windows smashed to gain entry.
- Residential burglary Manks Road burglary from farm shed
- Theft of bike from a school but later returned.
- Ram raid on Shell Service station in Koo wee Rup about 4am one morning. Police attended almost immediately as they were in Koo Wee Rup. Charges have already been laid.
- Counterfeit \$50 notes are circulating and some have been used at Woolworths in Koo Wee Rup

Sergeant Isles encouraged people to report any incidents, even if minor. Non-urgent incidents can be reported to 131 444, but always call 000 in an emergency. When he tries to get additional resources to the area, command points to the lack of reported crime.

Koo Wee Rup and Lang Lang Stations will each be staffed one day per week.

Koo Wee Rup every Thursday either 8am to 4pm or 9am to 5pm depending upon shift rosters.

Lang Lang every Tuesday

Across the state, car theft is mostly of high-end cars, recently there have been car thefts from gyms where people leave their keys where they can be taken while they are working out.

We are fortunate in this area that knife violence is not that prevalent, but violence in schools is increasing.

When reporting a stolen item give as much information to police as possible, eg serial number, model number, if it is engraved with an identifiable code anywhere (eg Driver's License number). It can't be returned to you if it is recovered, and you have not reported it missing.

#### **Smoke Alarm Installation Program**

CFA now has a free Smoke Alarm Installation Program happening where suitably trained volunteers will come to your house, do a survey on what smoke alarms you currently have installed, give you a few tips and information on the care of your alarms and then, if needed install new alarms.

As all alarms have a 10-year service life, all alarms should be replaced if they are more than 10-years old, batteries should be replaced regularly and they should be tested monthly.

The new smoke alarms installed by CFA have a lithium 10-year battery in them so they don't need changing but the whole alarm should be replaced after 10 years.

# Some odd happenings during our first three years in Australia 1970 -1973 by Geoff Stokes

It was December 2020 when I wrote my first story for 'Blackfish'. It was about my dear wife Olive and I touring Europe-particularly Switzerland - on our 150cc Lambretta scooter in 1959. We rode over the Simplon pass and then on to Milan with its magnificent opera house and arcades of shops. Since then, with my stories, I have tried to interest you in all the absorbing and the many happenings of our adventurous life, so here are yet more tales from Geoff to amuse and interest you – I hope!

Let's go back to 1971. We had been in Australia for just over a year and I had settled in well with my work when Alec, our company accountant, told me he had a holiday home at Mount Beauty, a small town in the mountains about four hours' drive from Melbourne. After Christmas in February 1972, he asked me if we, as a family, would like to spend a week or two there for our annual holiday. We jumped at the chance and did just that; the first holiday of what would be many over the years that we would spend in that delightful place. During the building of the Snowy River Hydro Electric scheme, Mount Beauty had been the headquarters of the project and many compact timber houses had been built to accommodate the workforce of several hundred personnel. Alec and Betty's holiday house was very basic accommodation, but the house was comfortable and cool under the shade of huge gum trees in the garden. The water for domestic use was heated in a wood fired boiler outside and we discovered many red back spiders in the various nooks and crannies around and in the place. Nothing unusual for the area we were told albeit a bite from one of these small arachnids could be fatal. We all had a super time exploring the town and the surrounding area, especially along the banks of the pristine Kiewa River that originated from the Bogong Dam high up in the mountains. Our favourite spot was a tiny

beach-like hideaway along the river where the crystal-clear water pooled into a swimming hole with a handy rock, good for jumping off, that conveniently

protruded into the deep end. The sandy banks of the river were speckled with gold, not real gold but 'fool's gold', in fact it was Iron Sulphide, a bright brassy colour. You could though pretend it was real gold! We spent most days here playing with the children, and both learned to swim here over the years as well as in the local swimming pool in the town. This first year we were in Mount Beauty, there were not many swimmers in the pool during the day because it was

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school term time and not holidays. So, we cavorted in the water and our flickering ciné films of the time show Jonathan jumping and splashing about and his dad doing belly flops from the lower diving springboard. You can see Jonathan mouthing to me to "Have a go Dad from off the top board, go on then" – I didn't!

My favourite memory on that first visit to Mount Beauty was of Jonathan our son, aged seven at that time, catching his first ever fish. We were fishing from the little bridge at the outlet from the lake where the water then continues on as the Kiewa River towards Toowonga. The Redfin fishes were so prolific and hungry that year that they were biting at a bare hook with no bait. Suddenly Jonathan strikes like a pro and there it is, on the end of his line, a fish for breakfast. His first ever fish; what excitement from us all; little Catherine and his Mum and I were so happy for him. There is one other fishing story to tell, and I am not quite sure whether it is this year I am writing about (1972) or later but it doesn't matter.

We were fishing from this same position on the bridge and hoping to take a trout or two. We had bait off a float, and it was drifting fast downstream when suddenly Jonathan shouted excitedly, "Dad, I have a bite". At exactly the same time a fellow angler, positioned at least a hundred metres downstream, on the left bank of the river, started to reel in vigorously. A single trout had struck at each bait and Jonathan and this other guy had caught the same fish – amazing. Another day we drove alongside the River Murray to visit the wineries at Rutherglen. Our everlasting memory is getting out of the car on the way to Rutherglen and I said, "Listen". There was absolute dead silence, not even a bird could be heard. It was quite overwhelming – the proverbial 'Sounds of Silence' – just amazing.

During our stay we explored the slopes of Mount Bogong and the ascending track that crossed this river tributary seven

times. Catherine, our daughter then aged just four, whilst paddling through one such crossing, attracted the attention of several black leeches that clung to her legs and arms, and they were slowly filling with her blood. It was with horror that we managed to eventually dislodge them; you can only imagine the consternation this episode caused. On the way home from our holiday we called in at Brown Brothers winery at Milawa to see if I could get them to use our new type of industrial ball valve. (You may recall my previous story about arriving in the country in 1970 with the first industrial ball valve to be seen in Australia made in the UK, safely locked in my briefcase). Our type of upmarket valve was also new to the wine industry and even stainless-steel vats, pumps and containers had only just arrived on the wine making scene. So, we tried to get Brown Brothers Winery interested in our ball valves on that first visit in 1972 but the guy there said, "We have no need for valves, we use bungs!". Within eighteen months they were one of our best winery equipment customers! We went on to sell valves to the wineries along the Barossa Valley in South Australia. Now, in 2024 they are a standard item almost everywhere and manufactured thousands in China!

But life goes on and we were soon back home in Templestowe, and everyday things were moving again and gradually normality, after a wonderful first holiday in Aus, resumed. The next show that our Musical Society planned to produce was "The King and I" by Rogers and Hammerstein; an ambitious project because there were lots of ladies and children required in the show together with two very strong leads. All had to be found within the near locality. I had the thought that I could play the part of 'The King' and, after my performance as Jimmy, the lead actor in "No, No, Nanette"; a few of the members were suggesting that very thing. "After all you do not have to follow how Yul Brynner played it, with a bald head and bare chest", they said. "You can be yourself". So, I practised the part and was well versed and very confident when I turned up for the auditions. I couldn't believe my eyes; there, dressed in black leather shorts, a shirt open to the waist and revealing a gold pendant on a neck chain, leather sandals and a bald head, stood a 1.85 metre fellow with his arms folded staring at me with a challenging look on his tanned face. Stupidly I asked him what part he was auditioning for, and he said, in a deep accented voice, "I am going for the part of The King" (You fool, his eyes said!) His name was Tony Kentuck and of course he got the part. The producer/director said to me, when I took the audition, "I'm sorry Geoff, Tony's got the part of the King — what can I do, I can't do anything else but give it to him, he's just made for it- just look at him! And so he was; Tony did a great job and became a good friend as well. I was given the part of the Kralahome, the Prime Minister, hardly any singing but an interesting dramatic part, I enjoyed it. It was a memorable show.

Olive and I began to realise that although we were happy living at the house in Hakea Street, Templestowe, it wasn't big enough for our growing family. Jonathan and Catherine each needed their own room so we sort of started to think about where to and when we could move. Well, I have to say it was me who dillied and dallied, whilst I was prevaricating and messing about, Olive swung into action! She was shopping in Templestowe one day when she happened to look on Estate Agent Peter McDougal's window and saw a house she thought would suit us. The agent said he didn't think it was the sort of house we were looking for but told Olive of a house being built in James Street, close by; would she like to go and have a look at it? She went along with him and fell in love with the place straight away and said to him that we would buy it and gave him a holding deposit on the spot. When I arrived home that day it was a fait accompli, and I was rushed off to see it before anyone else had wind of it. It was, and still is, a gorgeous house sitting then in a commanding position overlooking the valley of the road below to the high rise of the hill opposite with just one or two houses on the elevated horizon. It was built on the side of a hill, detached from other properties, and had four bedrooms, an ensuite to the main bedroom, a super floor tiled entrance hall and plenty of room to move about both inside and out. There was an extendedroof double car port with several steps up to the front door: quite imposing and in October 1972 very upmarket. So, we set into motion the wheels to purchase the house and enjoyed selecting wall and floor tiles, paint colours, carpets, curtains, bathroom suites etc., etc. At the same time, we put our first home of 2½ years for sale. Who else can say that his dear wife went shopping one Saturday morning and came back home and said quite nonchalantly, "I've just bought us a new house. I hope you like it". We sold quickly and soon we were living in James Street and, I must add, we were very happy. Lots of things had to be done; a shed for me, extra lighting, curtains, an d furniture, oh so many things. But we did it all and Olive will tell you that the next ten years spent there were very happy ones.

Until I researched the old programs I have kept, I always thought that the next show our theatre group produced was in the following year, 1973 but, in fact, it was in the November of this same year as "The King and I" and it was held at a very different venue to that of past shows; it was at Mitcham High School, today called Mullauna College. The show was to be "Kiss me Kate" and it was decided early on by the committee that the Mechanics Hall in Templestowe was not nearly big

enough for a production of this magnitude. Not only the hall, but the actual stage size could not possibly cope with the complex scene changes required for this musical extravaganza. The part I auditioned for was the lead, Fred Graham, a dual character who also played Petruchio. Let me explain. This most musical and amusing show draws on the traditional "play within a play" concept to portray the parallels between Shakespeare's "Taming of the Shrew" and the lives of the actors playing in that show. The musical opens at the end of the dress rehearsal for a new musical version of "The Shrew" in which the leads are played by Fred Graham and Lilli Vanessi who have been divorced from each other for a year. And so, on it goes, full of great songs and comedy routines. A testing time for all the singers/actors and there are lots of wonderful dances and skits along the way. I also did the lighting design for the show, so I was very busy indeed. There you are then, another slice of my life story for 1971 – '73, for you to enjoy or hiss with disinterest. Keep reading the 'Blackfish' for further instalments of this saga.

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#### The latest News from the Community Advisory Committee.

The Community Advisory Committee (CAC) met on the morning of the 21st of May and discussed some interesting subjects concerning patients, residents, and support people of the Koo-Wee-Rup Regional Hospital services. Now, if you are new to the township, I am sure you will be saying to yourself, "What is the CAC; what's it all about?" Well, the Committee looks at problems that may have arisen between the Koo-Wee- Rup and District Health Services (KRHS) and any of its users. These users could be for instance, patients in the hospital, residents in the hospital, carers of residents or patients, nurses in the hospital, members of the family of a resident or patient and any resident of Koo-Wee-Rup and District. The single aim of our Community Advisory Committee is to provide the KRHS Board of Management with feedback and advice from users to improve and strengthen the KRHS services, provide information, forward planning, and future policy development of the KHRS. Not necessarily complaints of individual bad service because there is already a system in place to handle sudden instances of mismanagement.

Our guest speaker was Werner Theinert, Consumer Consultant, Subregional Environmental Sustainability Working Group. His vision is to replace our current domestic gas-consuming appliances (when they require replacing) with more efficient renewables-powered electric appliances all within 8 to 10 years. For industry, the aim is to change over major industrial processes so that we'll be exporting green steel and green aluminium instead of iron ore, coal, bauxite, and alumina. His very interesting talk centring on the above vision, focussed on the change over but he did not discuss how it could be achieved over the existing electricity supply network cabling because there is over 850,000 km of distribution grid and 45,000 km of transmission grid in operation across Australia that is not suitable for renewables transmission.

Other matters discussed at this CAC meeting were the results of the completed CAC evaluation questionnaire with

#### Les O'Riordan's Recollections - Early Township Buildings


In 1968, Dave Mickle interviewed seventy-six year old Les O'Riordan. John Leslie O'Riordan was born on August 26, 1892 and is said to be the first white child born in the Koo-Wee-Rup Village settlement. His father, John O'Riordan, opened a store in the town in 1890 - it was a tin shed at the rear of what is now Light's garage.

Les married Margaret Colvin in August 1918 and they lived at *Mallow*, the headquarters of the Historical Society. Margaret's brother, A.C Colvin (Andrew) opened a cycle shop in the town in 1911 and later became an Agent for Ford Cars. Les died in 1978 and Margaret in 1955.

Some of the interview with Les is published in Dave's book *Mickle Memories*, but we also have the notes from the interview at the Historical Society, so what follows is a combination of both.

#### **Rossiter Road**

From the corner store going northwards (or down towards Bayles): on the left there was Thomson's butchers shop, Ross saddler. Bergin bootmaker and Turner's sweets shop, which was just before Jack Gray's house. Next Keighery's bootmakers saddlery. Still going north there was a timber building housing the London Bank (later moved to its current location - the ANZ bank). When the bank moved, Ben Darlington operated his radio shop from the site (where

the car yard was). Just over Gardiner Street was Mrs Greys' shop, then the Presbyterian Church and the Memorial Hall.

#### Station Street

Back to the Rossiter Road/ Station Street corner - the corner store was built for Bullocks, then owned by Finnigan, Battersby, Malouf, W.A Stephenson, Ernest Cougal and Ernest Williams.

Along Station Street was the new London Bank, then a small paddock and Joe Morrison's blacksmiths shop. Next to Joe Morrison was Colvin's cycle works and his Swastika café which he leased to the Misses Gallagher in 1922. The swastika was originally a symbol representing wellbeing and was used by many cultures until the rise of the Nazi Party in the 1930s. In the 1920s in Koo-Wee-Rup it was just a symbol of good luck, nothing sinister.

Molly O'Riordan's post office was next - it was described by Les as a small square building under a large pine tree, clearly seen in the picture. This little post office was removed, and Colvin's built a garage (Albons). At the rear of this site, the O'Riordans had built a coffee palace some years previously. It burnt down on the late 1920s/ early 1930s. O'Riordan's residence and store were next, on the corner of Moody Street. A room at the back of the store was used as the first hall.

Behind the hotel was Wilkins (later Johnson) bakery and Johnson Brothers (later De Vries) butchery.
