How exciting is watching the progress of the train mural on the back of the Woolies building? Simon White is working with a wall that measures roughly 50m x 10m. Below is the design concept sketch he is working from plus a couple of progress (and pre-work) shots. This is a project developed by the Township Committee. We have received 80% of our funding from the State Government Tiny Towns Grant program and will be splitting the remaining cost of the mural with the Koo Wee Rup Swamp Historical Society. We had asked Simon to create a mural with a train pulling into the old Koo Wee Rup station with spud trucks waiting to unload. What he has created is beyond our best hopes.



Koo Wee Rup Township Committee Meeting

The Township held its monthly meeting on Wednesday, 2 October at the KWR Community Centre. The next meeting of the Township Committee will be held on Wednesday, 6 November at 7:30 pm at the KWR Community Centre. Everyone is welcome to attend Township Meetings and join in the discussion.

The Township Committee applied for an Australia Day Grant of \$1,000 however we only received \$300. The meeting resolved to continue with the event for 2025 but will consider whether we can afford to carry the majority of the cost for the event in future years. Caroline will speak to council and our councillor regarding the grant and why the funding is so much lower than in previous years.

Caroline is meeting the artist on Monday 7th October, at the old railway platform to finalise the approach and design for the mural.

The search for new Koo Wee Rup Regional Health Service CEO has commenced. Jenny reported that the Christmas angel that was stolen from the front of the Uniting/Anglican Church has been found in the laneway behind Townley Road. It is being repaired by Rodney Edwards and will be ready for use again this Christmas.

Master Damian Grange - Taekwondo World Champion

Local man Damian Grange recently attended the World Haidong Gumdo Championships on Jeju Island, South Korea, as a member of the Australian Team. Master Damian won gold in individual sword patterns in the brown belt master's division.

Haidong Gumdo is a traditional Korean Sword Martial Art, similar to Japanese Samurai. Master Damian is a Taekwondo Instructor at Heenan Taekwondo Pakenham and made the natural progression to Haidong Gumdo approximately 2 years ago, under the tutelage of Grand Master Jung II Oh, Head Instructor Haidong Gumdo Australia and Australian Coach.

Australia took a 22 member team, from Victoria and Queensland, to the championships, including 5 members from Heenan Taekwondo Pakenham.

Australia finished equal first with South Korea, beating competitors from all over the world, including USA, Mexico, Italy, Kuwait, Germany, South Africa and assorted Asian countries.

poppies, please say 'Hi' and consider purchasing a poppy or badge.



Some of my earliest memories by Geoff Stokes

Saturday the 16th of July 1932 dawned bright and warm in Bradmore, Wolverhampton, England. It was a perfect summer's day, as recalled by my sisters, Eileen and Mary. Eileen was then 11 years old, and Mary was 8. Neither of them had any idea that my mother was pregnant and at lunchtime they were delighted to be told that they were to go to their friend's house to play and there they could stay for the rest of the day. So off they went to play with Alice Watkins and the Sheargold children at Watkins' old farmhouse in Church Road, about five minutes' walk away. From their farm the Watkins's supplied most of the village of Bradmore with milk. Mrs. Watkins delivered it to one's door via a horse drawn cart driven by Mr. Watkins. The cart carried several large metal churns of milk. As a child I remember her well; she always wore a light brown slop coat and carried the milk in a small churn with a handle for ease of transport. The milk was then ladled into our own jug or jugs and then taken to the pantry under the stairs where it was placed on a very large slab of cold marble. Here it stayed until wanted. There were no refrigerators in Bradmore then! One or two men often followed Mr Watkins and his horse and cart. They were hoping to collect manure droppings from the horse for their gardens as a super fertiliser!

It was normal at that time for mothers to be to have their babies delivered at home by the local midwife and I was no exception. That day at exactly 4-00pm I arrived into this world crying very loudly carrying on my head a crop of blonde hair, to the absolute delight of Mom and Dad who were now 46 and 42 years old. I weighed in at seven pounds (3.175 kg) exactly and always believed that I measured twenty-one inches (533mm). This seems so highly unlikely now when I really think about it, but someone somewhere must have told me at some time that this was the overall measurement of GJS. To say that I was a 'crier' was no exaggeration. I cried and cried so much that within a week of my birth I developed a hernia! A special spring loop pad was made to apply continual pressure to the 'rupture' and together with the revelation that my dear Mum's breast milk was not satisfying me, my crying sessions decreased dramatically. The loop must

have worked well because I didn't require any surgery. Mom kept this loop for many years as a memento and, I recall, when I was about thirty years old, it came out for a viewing and a laugh and that was the last time I saw it.

My sisters came home for tea very late that Saturday evening and discovered that they now had a brother, found as my mom explained to them, in the cabbage patch at the bottom of the garden! All of us accepted this explanation until my credulity was stretched to the limit at the age of seven or so and then other more believable facts had to be given to me. From day one I was spoilt beyond measure. My dear sisters and their friends played a large part in my infant upbringing and, together with my Mom's unswerving dotage on her longed-for son, I was in heaven. In retrospect, and I am talking now perhaps of my adolescent years and onward, this initial close and continual contact with loving females, shaped and tuned my relationships with the ladies over the years. I have always been able to understand, get on with, and indeed revere females of all shapes and sizes and have often preferred their intellectual company to males. All this, without falling in love with everyone I became close too and, unfortunately, all too often misunderstood by those around me. (Adolescent years excepted!)

My christening took place at St. Philip's Church on August the 10th of that year, the ceremony, as directed by the Church of England prayer book, was conducted by the Rev. T Jeremy the Curate of our Parish of Penn Fields. I was told that I behaved quite well and only cried when coming out of the church. I was dressed in the same christening gown that my father was christened in all those years before (1886). I never saw the gown in later life; it was said to have been donated for yet another Stokes's Christening (possibly one of Dad's great nieces, Elsie Mary Bowdler, also born in 1932). My Godparent's were my Mom and Dad (strange that?) and Elsie Hipwood, loving wife of my Dad's cousin, William (Bill) Stokes. Elsie is lovingly remembered by me as a dear lifelong friend and a beloved 'Aunty'. She re-married in the 1950's. William (Bill), her husband, died at the early age of twenty-six (1930). At the time it was said by the family that he had died from lead poisoning. Bill was a plumber who worked on domestic and commercial lead pipework. Lead was the standard material used for all household water pipe circulatory systems at the time and every metre of water supply pipework in our village was made of lead.

Dad, said, in explanation of Bill's early death, that Bill was a chain smoker and, as he smoked cigarettes, he tended to suck his fingers after 'wiping' the hot lead joints. The joint, with extra lead added for strength, looked like a swollen blister on the pipe: it was then wiped with a soft leather wiper while it was in a plastic and hot state so that it looked smooth and streamlined. As I said, this was done by hand with a square piece of supple leather. There is a suspicion, agreed with by my sisters, that he died from the unmentionable disease (in those days), cancer. However, he was rather young for that. Believe it or not the word 'Cancer' at this time was 'banned' from conversations because it was believed that the disease was inflicted on you for the misdeeds you had done to others. Therefore, if you have cancer, you are being punished for the serious wrongs you have done to others.

At this point in almost all 'life' stories the narrative will now jump from age nought to age five because, to most people, hardly anything except flashes of dubious and unclear memory, can be recalled. I shall be different here. I can clearly remember certain occasions and happenings taking place during my baby years. Friends, as well as well-meaning acquaintances have often substantially challenged this ability I have to remember some very early events in my life. I do realise and understand that the common explanation for this unusual early perception of events is, that when I was a very young boy, someone has told me of something that happened to me when I was a baby. It is then claimed that the story is then repeated to me so often as I grow older, that my initial imaginative picture of an event becomes, in my own mind, my very own exclusive memory of that event. Apart from saying, "Well, I just do remember, OK", I do have some proof that the recollections are really mine. My sisters always said to anyone who was interested that they remember *me* telling *them* of early events I recalled, not them telling me! And this from the time I could talk quite well at the age of eleven months. After all that technical stuff the reader probably wonders what sort of recollections I have. Are they exciting? Are they contentious family secrets? Did I overhear and understand things I shouldn't have? No! None of these things. What I do remember will very likely mean nothing to anyone else, but they do represent to me my experience of baby days and not in any way my perceived imagination of them.

I was sitting in my pusher under the lilac tree in the back yard and my legs were covered with a quilted blanket. I was fascinated with a man who was building a chimney on a roof that had no cover (tiles). The unfinished house was at the bottom of our garden. My sister Mary kept saying to me, "Chimney, chimney, chimney", and then she would chant," Chimney on fire / three miles higher / I'll tell the bobby who set it on fire". I learnt that particular rhyme very quickly and soon made a nuisance of myself singing it loudly everywhere we went for the next couple of weeks! The point and proof of this story is that it can be dated. The houses at the bottom of the garden that I saw being built at that time where in the then new Oxbarn Avenue running parallel to Victoria Road on the old Oxbarn Farm. The date was autumn 1933; I was perhaps about 14 to 15 months old. Photographs of me at that time show a chubby child with dimples in my cheeks and a quaff (probably Mom's design) of blonde curly hair. Same pusher and I remember being pushed up the hill in Bradmore Village, again with Mary at the white rubber lined handle and a large dog came over and licked my face. I was not frightened but I do remember the dog's owner hitting it with a stick and I cried about that. The dog's name was 'Gip'; he was black with a white patch over one eye.

I also recall visiting Dad at the annual camp of the St. Philip's Church Boys' Brigade Company. Dad had for many years run a BB Company at the church and was its Captain. A forerunner, of which he served as a Lieutenant, was a company of The Church Lads' Brigade. However, it was the Boys' Brigade that had an enormous influence on me during my early teenage years so, let's have a look at the background of this organisation in the thirties in Bradmore and Penn Fields and that of the CLB in earlier days. Again, let Dad tell it as it was.

"A company of the Church Lads' Brigade was enrolled at St Philip's, Penn Fields, an adjacent suburb, on the eighth of February 1898 and was attached to the Seventh Battalion, Litchfield Diocese. The Reverend William Kipling Cox was the Company Chaplain and Mr. Parsons and Mr. Stokes (me) were officers at some time later. The Company closed between 1901 and 1908, but was then revived, until 5th June 1913, when it was disbanded. The buglers of the Company of sounded 'The Last Post' and the 'Royal Salute on Trinity Sunday 22nd May 1910 at the 11 AM Service upon the death of King Edward VII a fortnight earlier. The text for the Sermon was: "Edward VII and Christian Duties".

Mr. Tansey (Nickname) Sproson, Dad's friend, who lived in Oxbarn Avenue, recalls marching from St. Philip's church to Queen Square Wolverhampton, about two miles (3.22 km) from Bradmore where they joined other companies and then marched to Wergs Hall, another two miles to the home of Colonel Hickman; after the festivities they marched back again. These festivities were part of those arranged for the Coronation of King George V in 1911. Dad continues, "The Battalion band under Captain Cotterall, followed by the St. Philip's Company (under me, Lieutenant Stokes C.O.) was part of the procession from the Church Schools in Church Road to a special commemoration service of Holy communion at the Parish church on the 24th of June 1911, on the Coronation of King George V. At this time, both the Church Lads' Brigade and the Boys' Brigade trained with cavalry type rifles".

Today one would think that 'boys' training with cavalry rifles' meant that the organisation was paramilitary. Nothing could be further from the truth. The precedence at that time for the quality upbringing of young men was the installation of discipline to their characters. Good discipline was considered absolutely essential to enjoy a decent and God-fearing life. It had to be thoroughly taught so that orders from a superior, teacher, doctor or the squire of the manor, would be instantly obeyed without question (also useful if one joined the army or navy at a later date!). This was achieved in the CLB and the BB with practising complex marching drill patterns from spoken orders and physically enhanced with the use of rifles, that were spayed. My father, born in Victorian times with Victorian mores, often told us that his own priorities of service were to 'God, King, Country, Family and Self" in that order!

This now brings me to our visit to Dad's BB camp mentioned a few paragraphs back! Dad only ever had two weeks annual holiday a year and this was always spent organizing and running his BB boy's camp. Mom, my sisters and me never went on holiday anywhere very far because when Dad was on his holiday from work there was always the BB camp. Mom, as I recall, never complained about it over the years afterwards and of course, these camps finished for us all in 1938. I believe that the camp this particular year (1935) was at Pattingham, a rural village quite close to Wolverhampton. I can recall being very embarrassed because, for the visit, I was dressed in a silken knitted suite: aqua-green with white angora wool trimmings! I marveled that so many lads were sleeping in one tent: a bell tent. I ran around and around, up and down, as I recall, entertaining all who would look at me. 1

remember gamboling across the grass to the applause of those who watched. Perhaps this was my first public performance of many to come? A BB boy asked me, as a tiny little one, whose father was the Captain, if I would post a letter for him in the camp post-pillar box and, of course, he had to lift me up to do that. I have a photograph of this event with everyone looking on smiling graciously. The year was 1935, August, and I was just three. Other following years I remember taking part in the camp sports. The sack race and the egg and spoon race; in one I fell into a muddy ditch and cried a lot because a wasp had stung my ear at the same time. That was quite a sting because my ear swelled up so much that the weight of my ear lobe seemed to pull my head over to one side. You may guess that I was well looked after by Mom and sisters with lots of TLC. After the disbandment of the St. Philip's BB Company in 1938, it would be 1946 before I went to my next BB camp. This time as a member of the Boys' Brigade, well prepared but still filled with those happy memories of Dad's camps.

There are other baby memories that live in my skull, but I won't bore you with story details I'll just tell you about just a couple. About this time, I performed for my Auntie Floss (Florence, my mother's sister) by sitting on my potty and dragging it with my legs all-round the floor of the living room. Boy, was I clever? Did I laugh? Yes, I did. I can easily remember how very clever I felt. That is, until the potty hit an obstacle of some kind, and I fell off and the contents of the pot slowly,

slowly spread across Mom's best carpet, this was a carpet that Mom had made with her own hands. Whilst we are talking body fluids, and again even at this very early age I was embarrassed, I shot a fountain of wee all over Eileen whilst she was changing my nappy. Yes, I do remember this, and it was me who reminded Eileen of it some years later. She had, in fact, forgotten all about it. Mary didn't forget her little 'accident' she had with me though: she accidentally tied my little 'willy' in the strings of my pajama trousers as she was putting me to bed one night. You can bet I remembered that one because it jolly well hurt!

Again thanks to the ordinary weather forecast, the next round of Friday Triples was cancelled. Hopefully we will get a game in shortly but in hindsight a good decision.



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





One international grand prize winner and 23 merit award winners are chosen each year for their unique and heartfelt visions of peace created from crayon, water colour, pencil and other mediums. All winners receive a cash prize and certificate.

Mustapha El Tawokji from war-torn Beirut, Lebanon, won the first Peace Poster Contest in 1988-1989 by expressing the theme, "Peace Will Help Us Grow," with a dove flying over a bed of roses. While he had never known peace, he expressed his vision of what peace would be like.

Grand prize winners have come from all over the world: Italy, Japan, Indonesia, Brazil, South Africa and the United States, just to name a few. The artwork and creativity of every child who enters the contest is celebrated by its sponsoring Lions club. Each young artist's work reflects his or her own experience, culture and worldview.

Visually impaired young people can have the opportunity to share their expressions of peace through the Lions International Essay Contest. Each year students ages 11 to 13 enter short essays on the same theme as the Peace Poster program for a chance to win a cash prize.

Both contests trace their roots back to a program in the 1960s called the Peace Essay Contest. To help celebrate LCI's 50th anniversary in 1967, Lions asked young people ages 14 to 21 to submit an essay on peace. More than 1 million entries were received. Former U.S. President Dwight D. Eisenhower served as honorary chairman of the international panel that chose high school student A. Russell Wodell of Cranbrook, British Columbia, Canada, as the winner for his essay titled, "Is Peace Attainable?"

"There is no easy road to peace," wrote Wodall. "Only through evolution of his social, moral and intellectual values can man achieve true peace with himself."

Young people from around the globe continue to offer Lions their expressions of peace in the hopes that one day the dream may come true.



Thomas Roxburgh – Asparagus Pioneer

Over ninety percent of Australian asparagus is grown on the Koo Wee Rup Swamp and asparagus has been commercially grown in this region for over 100 years, so this is a look at the early history of asparagus growing on the Swamp.

The first mention I can find of asparagus was in *The Australasian* of October 31, 1896. There was a report on James Pincott's farm *about three miles from Bunyip* -

one of the most interesting and best managed in the settlement. Mr. Pincott carried out some experiments for six months for the Agricultural Department on this plot, when the fertility of the soil was being tested, and the place locally has consequently become known as the "experimental farm." He grew potatoes, onions, strawberries, and clover, amongst other crops and found that Asparagus and celery can be raised to wonderful perfection.

The next reference was in *The Age* of May 10, 1912 when it was reported *That land on the Kooweerup Swamp can be turned to more profitable account than growing potatoes has been demonstrated by Mr. Roxborough* [sic]; who, although a busy man in Melbourne, pays a good deal of attention to his farm at Iona, and for a considerable time has experimented in the cultivation of asparagus. Some three years ago he put in one acre as a test, adopting the American principle of planting 1 foot in depth and 3 feet between the plants, with rows 10 feet apart, so as to allow of cultivation between, the soil being of a peaty nature. Now he has nine acres under asparagus, and intends extending the area, as the managers of hotels and cafes in Melbourne have advised him that the asparagus is of the finest quality.

Some time ago Mr. Roxborough induced an American expert to visit the locality, and he declared that the Kooweerup Swamp land is particularly well adapted for this, form of cultivation, and Mr. Roxborough's experience bears out his opinion. It is stated that a Melbourne jam factory has offered to put up a canning factory if Mr. Roxborough will agree to put 20 acres under asparagus.

Who was Thomas Roxburgh and where was his farm? His farm, *Cheriton Park*, was on the corner of Fallon Road and Simpson Road at Vervale, even though it is also listed in the newspapers (such as in the article above) as being at Iona, Garfield or Catani. The farm was locally known as Roxburgh Park and was 352 acres. The Roxburgh's had begun their purchase of land on the Koo Wee Rup Swamp in 1902-1903.

Thomas Roxburgh was born in Jamaica, West Indies to Adam Roxburgh and Jane Watson. The family arrived in Melbourne on September 28, 1853 when Thomas was two years old. They moved to Ballarat which was where he married Sarah Anne Holthouse on July 2, 1879. Sarah was the daughter of Ballarat's *well known and most esteemed citizen*, Dr Thomas Le Gay Holthouse, as he was described in a newspaper report, and his wife Hanna (nee Pratt). As noted in Thomas' obituary - *Later he became a member of the firm of James Fry and Co., wheat millers and ship charterers. In 1895 Mr. Roxburgh commenced business on his own account as a grain and shipping broker in Collins-street, and this business he personally conducted practically up to the time of his death. He did a large business with the East, and was agent for steamers trading with Japan. Mr. Roxburgh established an asparagus farm at Garfield, Gippsland, where an extensive business is conducted by his two sons, Mr. Leslie le Gay Roxburgh and Mr. Reginald Owen Roxburgh.*

Thomas and Sarah had seven children; the first two children were born in Ballarat and the others in Hawthorn -

Edith Jenny (1880-1881)

Mabel Stella (1881-1970)

Leslie Le Gay (1884 -1969, married the delightfully named Miss Widgie Potts of Narrabri, NSW, in 1915. Her real name was the more prosaic Ann)

Reginald Owen (1889-1953, 1st A.I.F)

Dorothy Alice (1890-1987)

Leeuwin Beatrice (1895 - 1981, married Peter Charles Ferguson, of Barcaldine, QLD, in 1924)

Mary Hope Bradgate (1899 - 1978, married Jeffrey Ivey Retallack in 1942).

Thomas Roxburgh died on December 29, 1931 and his wife, Sarah Anne, on July 24, 1942, aged 84. They are buried at Brighton Cemetery. *Continued next page*

Back to Thomas and his asparagus, he did not personally work on the farm, he employed farm managers and later his son, Leslie, managed the farm. By 1927 it was reported he had planted 100 acres of asparagus, and his farm was one of the most lucrative farms on the Kooweerup Swamp area, as a ready sale is found for the product at £1 per box. The rich,

peaty soil is particularly adapted for the production of the plant, which grows to perfection. By 1932, the farm had 120 acres under asparagus and in the cutting season 20 to 25 men are employed every day, and from 10cwt. to 15cwt. of asparagus a day are despatched. [cwt - hundred weight or 112 pounds or 50 kg].

During the Second World War, the Roxburgh farm had the Australian Women's Land Army (AWLA) girls working on the property. The AWLA was established to fill the gap in agricultural workers due to the War. They had training at Mont Park or the Werribee Research Station and were then allocated to farms.

The Argus of November 11, 1942 interviewed Mr G. Roxburgh (this was Thomas' son Leslie Le Gay, who was listed in the Electoral Roll at Vervale, occupation farm manager) - about the Land Army 'girls' and the family farm which was growing asparagus for the use of the Army. Mr Roxburgh was quoted as being "very proud of the girls. He finds them fine workers, though physically they cannot stand up to the same speed of work as the men. He thinks that 5 girls can do the work of 3 men". "They are steady workers," Mr Roxburgh said, "and once I have told them what fields I want done I do not have to worry again." The women did the cutting, placing the spears into bundles, the picking up of the bundles onto the cart and also worked in the packing shed.

The report goes onto describe the living conditions - There are 20 girls, and they live in a camp on the estate, where they sleep in tents and have a small recreation hut. The camp is run on the lines of a Girl Guides' camp, as

2 of the girls first there are Guides, and they helped to establish the camp. The day is a long one. The girls rise at 6.15 and are in the fields at 7.30. They have one hour for lunch, 12 to 1, when they all go to the cookhouse for a generous hot meal, and then spend 20 minutes or so in their tents resting. Work finishes about 5.30, or sometimes earlier if they are able to get through their day's work quicker. In spite of this long day, the reporter said that after work the girls often ride the 6 miles on bicycles to Garfield, to go to the pictures or to a dance. The day I was there several girls were going to walk 2 or 3 miles to a dance!

In June 1943, *The Herald* reported on the state of the asparagus industry - *Victoria's crop, which is estimated to be nearly 40,000 cases, each containing 24 2-lb. tins, is*

grown by about 20 growers on nearly 1000 acres in the Koo-Wee -Rup, Portarlington and Barwon Heads, and Bairnsdale districts. All but about 20 per cent of the crop, which was sold fresh, was processed for Commonwealth consumption.

However during the War the Federal Government declared asparagus to be a luxury item. Charles Gartside, M.L.C., of Gartside Brothers Cannery, was not happy about this and he was interviewed by *The Herald* on June 1, 1943 on the issue - *The action of the Commonwealth Department of Agriculture in listing asparagus as a luxury vegetable and taking over the entire crop for the services was a "political move designed to impress on civilians the need for austere living" one of Victoria's leading canners. Mr Gartside, M.L.C., said today.*

Canneries which had processed practically the entire output, were virtually told that tins could not be provided for asparagus designed for civilian consumption. Instead of canning asparagus in long spears, canneries had been ordered to cut it into small soup pieces, which turned good food into pig's food, claimed Mr Gartside. Both civilians and service personnel were prevented from eating asparagus as it should be eaten - long spears dipped in melted butter or iced - and troops would have to eat it in soup or with a fork.

The main processors at the time were the Gartside Brothers Cannery at Dingley, the Rosella Preserving Company or A.J.C. (Australasian Jam Company).

From October 1944 there was a small Italian Prisoner of War Camp at Koo Wee Rup and the men were allocated to work on various local farms, including the Roxburgh farm. My Dad, Frank Rouse, who was ten at the time, remembers truckloads of the prisoners driving down the road to the farm in the morning, one guard on each truck. At lunch time a food van with a portable cooker would go the farm to feed them.

Cheriton Park was advertised for sale by auction in 1947 and at that time it had 125 ac

res of asparagus under production. The top offer was £20,750, but this was below the reserve and the sale was not completed. Two years later the *Weekly Times* of November 24, 1949 could report that the Koo Wee Rup Swamp had 1,300 acres under asparagus.

In April 1951 *Cheriton Park* was on the market again and was sold for a price close to the reserve of £39,000. The buyer was A.J.C., the Australasian Jam Coy. Pty. Ltd., a subsidiary of Henry Jones Ltd. They held the land until around the early 1970s.

There were several other early growers from the Koo Wee Rup Swamp which I found reports on. In October 1934, *The Age* reported that - *Smaller plantations in this locality are also being cultivated by Messrs. Dick and Hardy, with favorable results. Several other progressive farmers are also contemplating a change from potatoes. At Cora Lynn, Mr. D. Kinsella (Kinsella Bros.) has this season planted a 12-acre paddock. Mr. Wadsley has long been the pioneer of this vegetable at the "Five-mile."*

Ten years later in September 1944, *The Age* published a short obituary of Mr Wadsley - *Mr Charles William Wadsley*, *JP*, 53, died at his home, Strathallan, Koo-wee-rup, on Tuesday after a long illness. Mr Wadsley was a former president of Berwick Shire, in which he represented lona Riding for 11 years. He retired three weeks ago. He was an expert on asparagus growing, and in addition to his own property supervised an asparagus farm at Geelong.

The Weekly Times of March 22, 1941 reported on Alf Ellett, another asparagus grower -

When, in 1937, the whole of his farm was submerged for upwards of a week, Mr. Alf Ellett found that, when the water subsided, his few rows of asparagus - grown for his own use - alone had survived. Indeed, their subsequent growth showed

that they had actually benefited from the thorough soaking which the land had received. The thought then occurred to him that asparagus growing was worth developing, not only as being equally profitable as other forms of vegetable culture, but as a safeguard against future floods. He thereupon set about putting almost the whole of his 42-acre block under asparagus.

There is still a reminder of *Cheriton Park*. There was an interview in the *Pakenham Gazette* of December 8, 1999 with Bill Roxburgh, the grandson of Thomas. In the interview Bill talks about how his grandfather, who owned *Cheriton Park*, had planted all different kinds of trees on a five acre section of his land and had built his own park to relax in. Some of the trees are still there, on the corner of Fallon Road and Simpson Road.
