Our Major Road Project nears completion

The first clear signs of how good the upgrade to the KWR-Pakenham Road is going to be are here. The section of road that replaces the dangerous bends section at the Northern end is open. 2 lanes in each direction, a 3m hard shoulder on each side, 100kph speed limit, lovely big roundabouts, a smooth gentle bend rather than hazardous tight turns, and a bike and walking track for the length of the road.

The lower section of the road still needs to be resurfaced and lane marked, but you can see the outline of what it's going to be.

With the opening of the new bridge over the freeway at Pakenham, you can now see a bike/walking track has been built on the new section of bridge. We still need to lobby for a safe bike/walking track



into Koo Wee Rup, but the rest of the distance to Pakenham station and shops will be completed soon. We hope to see the bus stops at the South East Business Park put into operation soon, as part of the KWR-Pakenham bus service.

Email report from Jordan Crugnale

Firstly a big thank you to all involved in being a successful Tiny Town recipient/fabulous project and it will look amazing and add colour and life and history and more to a big blank canvas of a supermarket wall.

I was hoping to swing by tonight's meeting but now have to head home for family.

The lights in the bus shelters have been fixed and whilst I was informed the overhead lights were fixed they have not been so crews are heading back out. Hopefully the wait will not be too long.

The Pakenham - KWR duplication we hope will fully open in the next few weeks as major works are being completed. There will be ongoing finished touches (so to speak) which will continue.

I have spoken with Ausnet and escalated again a response to your letter.

The information below is what I was hoping to speak to tonight which has been emailed from Ausnet.

From Ausnet:

Koo Wee Rup Township Committee (KWRTC) discussion on reliability on the local network.

Our Team has been doing a bit of work looking into this - I understand the local community are looking for some information on:

- The causes of the outages that have impacted them in recent years;
- What's been done to address this; and
- AusNet's communications during an outage.

There's broad issues that have impacted the network in the last few years that we have discussed; these include

- The catastrophic storms in February 2024, June and October 2021 and August 2020;
- More vegetation and wildlife that you see in rural areas coming into contact with lines; and
- The significant upgrades to bushfire prevention technology across the network; which have required more prolonged planned outages to install and safely test.

Specifically to Koo Wee Rup, to date this year there have been three extended unplanned outages, including the February storm event.

The other two were thoroughly investigated by our field teams, and while no direct cause could be found for one, the other our crews observed possible lightning damage to a conductor. Another three outages of between 8 and 14 minutes were also noted. The last few years have seen varied numbers of prolonged unplanned outages, from 1 in 2021 to 8 in 2020 - with 6 in both 2023 and 2022.

In terms of the upgrades and local maintenance AusNet has undertaken, we undertook significant maintenance in that area in 2021 and 2022, along with the installation of a REFCL at the substation in Lang Lang in 2022 (<u>ausnet-powerline-bushfire-safety-refcl-overview-fact-sheet-1.pdf (ausnetservices.com.au)</u>).

On communications, please encourage your constituents to register their mobile phone numbers with their energy retailer - we get the data from them to contact people via sms during an outage. They can also follow our Facebook page where we post information and warnings ahead of extreme weather events.

We'll continue to monitor the local network closely to see if there's more work we can do - please let me know if you hear anything through your channels.

We'd also encourage the KWRTC to explore their options with AusNet's Energy Resilience Community Fund (<u>Energy</u> <u>Resilience Community Fund - Ausnet (ausnetservices.com.au</u>)) and look at opportunities to build resilience to the future extreme weather events we know are coming as a consequence of climate change.

We are happy to brief you, your office and the Koo Wee Rup Township Committee on these matters in more detail if needed, and undertake some similar work in some of the other communities in your electorate impacted by similar events.

Bus Service to Pakenham

There are now signs at the industrial estate near the freeway for the bus stops. Enquiries were made to PTV who referred the enquiry to Westernport Buslines who run the service, Westernport referred enquiries back to PTV. Gary will keep following up on this, has already spoken to Jordan.

Lifts at the new Pakenham Station are not working. Taxis are being provided to take people to other stations to access trains. Or the lift on the outbound platform is working so you can take a train the Pakenham East and then board the Melbourne train there.

It was suggested that the Vline Bus should provide a late night service on Friday and Saturday nights, the last bus from Southern Cross on week nights is 9pm, and Saturday and Sunday 5:46pm. These times are not suitable if you are attending events in Melbourne such as the footy or stage shows.

Koo We Rup health service has a community bus that is available for community use.

Smoke Alarm Installation Program

CFA has a free Smoke Alarm Installation Program happening where suitably trained volunteers will come to your house, do a survey on what smoke alarms you currently have installed, give you a few tips and information on the care of your alarms and then, if needed install new alarms.

As all alarms have a 10-year service life, all alarms should be replaced if they are more than 10-years old, batteries should be replaced regularly and they should be tested monthly.

The new smoke alarms installed by CFA have a lithium 10-year battery in them so they don't need changing but the whole alarm should be replaced after 10 years.

A slice of my life in the mid-eighties by Geoff Stokes

We moved from Templestowe to rural Smiths Gully in 1983. We fancied a life in the country with sheep to look after and a horse for our daughter and the quietness of the countryside for our son whilst he studied for a medical degree. Life became very different to the Melbourne suburbs we had been used to. So, it was to a house at the top of a hill we moved into.

We became friendly with all our neighbours, in particular John and Julie who lived on the opposite side of the hill with Smiths Gully Road running between us and Neil and Merron who lived to our right at the bottom of the hill. Next door to them lived Mick and Bridget who eventually bought several acres of land further along the road and built themselves a substantial mansion together with several acres of vineyards. The subsequent products were very fine wines. However, we were closer to the former two couples and, together with Jane and Max our nearest neighbours, we organised several parties over the five years that we lived in the Gully. Twice Olive and I organised a 'fondue night' where we presented authentic Swiss fondues to our guests; knowledge of them gained from my business trip that country in 1979. It wasn't easy at that time to obtain real Swiss cheeses, but we had no difficulty in finding the Kirsch to stir into the fondue. Together with deserts, and with Max and Neil playing their guitars, we had real super nights. These fondue nights are still talked about by our friends to this day. John and Julia also organised parties, and one in particular I recall was that of a fancy-dress night finishing up with us all sitting around a bonfire in their front paddock. Neil and Merron also organised great nights over the years and with them, one, was a 'port night'. We all had to bring along a bottle of port and there would be a blind tasting of it to find out which of the bottles had the best and most palatable port. It was a good evening with lots of good food and eventually the winning bottle of port was revealed. It was ours! For a joke we had taken along the cheapest bottle we could find and yes, it won! We just couldn't believe it -neither could anyone else. Neil had built a wine cellar into the side of the hill, and he stocked it with fine wines and some homemade wines, in particular a homemade port made in 1965, and we still have some of it left today. Just occasionally, a large sip keeps it from going down the bottle too fast! So, this was the place for the men of the Gully to assemble on a Sunday or Saturday lunchtime for a taste (that's what we called it anyway) and a chat as men do! In other words, we were enjoying living in Smiths Gully with lots of caring friends and neighbours about us. Many times, after our get-togethers Olive and I found it difficult to negotiate the steep hill to our house on our way home up the winding drive!

Another year came and went, and our next job was to organise a party for our son Jonathan's twenty-first birthday. Jonathan's 21st birthday was on the 22nd of December 1986, too close to Christmas for us to organise a party on that date and, in any case, his friends from university and his mates from his old school were all away on holiday or, by then, far away at home. So, we decided to celebrate Jonathan's birthday in the New Year, January as I recall, with a get together in the bottom paddock of our home in Smiths Gully. This was a propitious time because my dear sister Mary decided that she and her son, would come and visit us from the UK and would be here for the party. Neither had been out to Australia before so it was an exciting time all round, what with their visit and Jonathan's twenty-first birthday celebration at the same time. So, we set a day in January for the party. One of my contacts from somewhere ran a party-hire business so we hired most of the gear from his premises in Richmond. Mick, our next door but one neighbour, lent me his USA built four-wheel drive; a Ford F250 and trailer, a huge beast of a thing, to go into town to bring back all the gear in one hit. There was a large marquee complete with dance floor and chandeliers, a bar tent and a portable loo/bathroom, tables, an amplifying system, party lighting strings, chairs and other smaller items that today I can't remember. Neil and I slashed the paddock first and then all the neighbours gave a hand to erect the marguee and install the dance floor. Ross our neighbour to the right of us (and down the hill) was, and still is, an electrician. He connected the lights in the Marquee and the power for the bar to Jane and Max's electricity supply box. We brought down the hill the spare fridge from the garage and installed it into the bar tent complete with champagne and other wines and beers. The unisex loo was put in place and the fire pumps set up discretely down near the creek. Signs were erected for parking and other info, and we were ready to go. In the meantime, Mary and David had arrived and became immediate Aussies; they simply fell in love at once with our part of Australia. The very morning, we brought them home from the airport and we were sitting in the garden having a cup of tea when an echidna walked across the lawn; we had never seen one around our place before! Not only that but, at the same time, a hairy nosed wombat waddled across the driveway and later a kangaroo came and looked over the top fence. Can you believe that? Mary and David thought that they were in heaven compared to the industrial Midlands where they lived in the UK and had left just thirty-four hours previously. We employed caterers to provide all the food for the party and to supply the very smart waiters who did an excellent job. The party went very well. The evening do was fancy dress and the theme was Rock and Roll or Pop Stars; Jonathan arriving as Freddy Mercury. The band, all Jonathan's friends from school, was the now famous group called 'Things of Stone and Wood'; at that time, they were fledgling musicians; now 'Things of Stone and Wood' are an established professional group; they were excellent. I can't resist not telling you just a couple of stories about that evening.

I had walked back up the hill to our house to pick up something and the phone rang. It was our new neighbour from next to Julia and John's house and he was upset with the loud music. He and his family had just arrived in the community and had shown no sign of wanting to get to know any of us and they had kept to themselves – not easy to do. We didn't know them at all, so they hadn't been asked to the party; I realised too late that they were the only family from our local community that we had not asked! I did know he was a forensic investigator with the Victorian Police Force. I told him this was a one-off party, and it would finish before mid-night. At about half-past eleven, just as we were winding down, we had unexpected visitors; the local Bobbies turned up. They had been asked to call and check on this loud party attended, they said, by bikies and weirdly dressed people. It was the bloke across the road of course who had complained to his policemen mates, and he must have also been really upset by the clothing worn by the people he saw arriving. It didn't dawn on him that we were all in fancy dress! I made a point of not drinking that night so that the visiting police, a lady and a man, were greeted by a very sober father of the party's 21st celebrator. They understood the situation but not before confessing that they were very apprehensive on their way to Smiths Gully, wondering who and what they were

going to encounter after the report of bikies partying and boozing in the area. In fact, not too much was drunk that night, I can't remember any of Jonathan's friends or him for that matter having had too much to drink. After dancing through the evening, they collapsed with fatigue after the party finally finished, spreading themselves all over the floor of our house. Ross, our neighbour however, had had far too much to drink and, as he waved goodbye to walk home across the paddock via the creek, we saw his silhouette disappear down into the water as he missed his footing and dropped into the shallow mud! As I said - a great night.

My private work for a company called Basil V Greatrex was going reasonably well but didn't really make too much money for us. I worked alongside another private rep, Richard, who represented another of Greatrex's products and one memorable day he brought his American agent to see us and the coun tryside around Smiths Gully. Richard and I organised a barbecue for him at our home and the main course of three was really something. Best fillet steak topped with fresh lobster and covered in Olive's beautiful hollandaise sauce. All washed down with the best wine available - paid for by Greatrex of course. Tom was our visitor's name, as I recall, and the afternoon



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wound up with Tom riding Catherine's horse Trinity. On his way back to Melbourne he saw a huge mob of Kangaroos in the paddocks and that really made his day. Something to tell the folks back home in the USA about, I am sure of that.

It was a wonderful surprise to receive an invitation to dinner in Melbourne from the owners of Basil V. Greatrex. The patriarch of the Company would be there with his brother and their respective wives. They chose Stephanie Alexander's restaurant called 'Stephanie's Restaurant', located in the Melbourne suburb of Hawthorn. This restaurant closed in 1997 and in all those 21 years it was open it was recognized as Melbourne's finest. Olive and I were booked into a first-class hotel, and we were looking forward to a splendid me al. And it certainly was because the waiters, and it seemed we had one each, recognized that there were two obvious millionaires at the table, and nothing was too much for them. I cannot remember details of the meal only that it was very nice indeed, but I do remember that towards the end of the meal one of the bosses' wives said we should all have the best champagne in the restaurant's cellar. It was ordered and the waiter was told to keep it coming – when one bottle was finished, please bring on another. It was a super time and finally we were taxied off to our hotel a little worse for wear to finish off what was quite a romantic evening. Unfortunately, I developed a bad bout of indigestion and reflux, so I had to sit up in a chair most of the night much to Olive's chagrin! I should have recognized those symptoms then and maybe I would have had less trouble later with my future gastric misfortunes.

My theatrical life continued in my spare time – mostly evenings. Ed Seppings was an old thespian mate of mine. We had acted together in 'No No Nanette', the first show I did in Australia in 1971, and, we had acted together in other

Doncaster and Templestowe shows and plays. He was now running the Foote Street Theatre Company, a vehicle for the youth of the area to help them get acting and performing experience. The Group had been very successful having been born in 1975 as a series of drama workshops graduating into a Youth Theatre. Some of their productions included, "Once a Catholic" and "Under the Yum Yum Tree" and the well-loved rock musical "Godspell". Ed told me he was directing and producing their next production, "On the Good Ship Lollipop" to be presented at two venues, Argenti's Receptions (Doncaster) and The Doncaster Gallery. He explained to me that it was "Theatre" with a difference because neither venue was actually a theatre. This venture would be following in the tradition of the original travelling troubadours taking their own show and trappings with them to everywhere and anywhere. The show story was based on the (then) "Love Boat" television series - a show within a show; a Ship's Crew who put on a show for their passengers, the audience. Ed wanted to know if I would play the part of the ship's Captain; an acting, singing and dancing role important to the continuity of the other more youthful parts in the show. I said I would and so started preparation for the production to be presented in October of that year, 1987, some six months away. One of the high lights for me was tap dancing with a tiny 'Shirley Temple' whilst she sang "On the Good Ship Lollipop'.

Rehearsals were to be held in Ed and Jan Seppings house in Hawthorn, very close to my new office that I now shared with a new business friend Alan. So, after the other people in the office went home in the evening I stayed on, ate my sandwiches for tea, and practised my lines, before going on to Ed's for the rehearsal. I also knew Ed's wife Jan very well; she was also a regular in the Doncaster and Templestowe theatrical world. Eventually opening night came and it all went off very well with everybody having a good time. The show was well liked by our audiences and, indeed, I enjoyed being in it too albeit that I felt an ancient among these youthful players! We had an expert dance instructor teaching us how to tap dance – Karen Walsh – who went on to become a professional actor and to perform in many other shows around Australia, one of which was *"Nunsence"* in 1990 alongside June Bromhill. We gave six performances in all and at one of them the show was videoed. If you want to have a sneak peek at it, it's available in the family library. It is a simple video, just a static home camera on a stand and if you can forgive the amateur cameraman, it just about shows you a good sample of what we were trying to achieve. The last night arrived, and we all swore we would stay friends and get together again very soon. We never did.



The latest news from the Community Advisory Committee.

The Community Advisory Committee (CAC) met on Tuesday 20th of August 2024 at the Eco House, Koo-Wee-Rup Regional Hospital Services (KRHS). The Committee warmly welcomed a new member, Gwen Murrey to the group, and Gwen is representing all people who are reliant on others to take them to places and meetings. At the 'round the table' discussion, Gwen brought up a question; that of the availability of free transport to appointments by the hospital volunteers. Gwen was informed that it was available in the past, but this question will now be put to the appropriate person at KRHS for clarification asap.

The Committee were then introduced by video to the new Chair of the KRHS, Dr Andy Fordyce B.HSc, MBBS, GAICD. Dr Andy Fordyce is a Medical Doctor with a strong connection to rural communities. Hailing from Deniliquin NSW and linked to the local Bass Coast Community he understands the vital role health care plays in rural communities. His primary skill set is in clinical governance, audit and risk management. Dr. Andy introduced the new Health Service Plan to the meeting and explained its ambitions within the geographical areas of southeast Melbourne and Gippsland. At this time nothing has been finalised and the subject is up for discussion alongside a summary document of the Health Services plan. Later in the meeting Aileen Thoms, Primary Health & Innovation Director, led a lively discussion on this proposed plan which incorporates partnering in health care communication, local health services networks, effective communication and enhancement by and of mutual coordination. The plan will be an important subject for the Board of Directors at their forthcoming meetings.

Now, if you are new to the township, I am sure you will be saying to yourself, "What is the CAC; what's it all about?" Well, the Committee looks at problems that may have arisen between the Koo-Wee-Rup and District Regional Health Services (KRHS) and any of its users. These users could be for instance, patients in the hospital, residents in the hospital, carers of residents or patients, nurses in the hospital, members of the family of a resident or patient and any resident of Koo-Wee-Rup and District. The single aim of our Community Advisory Committee is to provide the KRHS Board of Management with feedback and advice from users to improve and strengthen the KRHS services, provide information, forward planning, and future policy development of the KHRS; not necessarily complaints of individual bad service because there is already a system in place to handle sudden instances of mismanagement. At the same time, we will have a guest

speaker to talk to us about relevant problems or highlights of the KRHS system and the wider world of the South Gippsland area system.

Now, to our friends and neighbours in Koo-Wee-Rup and District, remember, any of our Committee members will be available to help you if you want to communicate with the Koo-Wee-Rup Regional Health Service Board of Management about problems that could be upsetting you, as a patient, a resident or a carer, and also, maybe, as an individual Koo-Wee-Rup resident. Any Community Advisory Committee member will listen to you closely and acknowledge your concerns, so that any problem you may have is understood and seriously considered. We are your best advocates always. Further to that please have a serious thought about you, joining us as a committee member; your thoughts and opinions of these subjects would help us a lot so do have a go. Also, if you as a consumer/customer, have a suggestion or some nagging thoughts about your difficulties, or your dependant's comforts or problems with any aspect of the KHRS, then get in touch with the KHRS CAC. The next meeting of the committee is planned for the 19th of November 2024 at 10:00 am. Before then we shall have many informal meetings with each other to check on any community problems that may have arisen or are arising.

Call for candidates for Cardinia Shire Council election

Candidates ready to stand in the upcoming Cardinia Shire Council postal election are urged to use the Victorian Electoral Commission's (VEC's) newly refreshed Candidate Helper to get their applications ready for submission when nominations open on Monday 9 September.

There are several important steps prospective candidates must complete before nominating.

If you want to represent your local community, make sure to confirm your eligibility and complete the mandatory online candidate training through Local Government Victoria before lodging your nomination. This rule applies to all candidates, including those who are currently or have previously been a councillor.

The VEC's online Candidate Helper at <u>vec.vic.gov.au/council-candidate</u> allows candidates to pre-fill their nomination forms before submitting them at their nomination appointment.

Candidates can also watch a series of videos on key topics such as the nomination process, including the rules and procedures that apply. More information is available online at <u>vec.vic.gov.au</u>. The *Candidate Handbook* is also available on the VEC website.

Prospective candidates are also encouraged to attend the candidate information sessions being held in each electorate before the opening of nominations.

Prospective candidates must make an appointment to submit their nomination forms and pay the \$250 fee in person during business hours. They must provide evidence that they have completed the online candidate training, as this is required by law and will be shown on each candidate's nomination form.

Candidates must make an appointment to submit their nomination form in person at the election office by calling the Candidate Helpline 03 8620 1316 between Tuesday 20 August and Monday 9 September. From Monday 9 September candidates can call 131 832 and they will be directed through to the relevant election office.

Nominations close at 12 noon on Tuesday 17 September. Late nominations will not be accepted.



Join the 2024 Biodiversity Blitz this September

Biodiversity Month is held every September and aims to promote the importance of protecting, conserving, and improving biodiversity both within Australia and across the world.

Cardinia Shire Council is partnering with other Melbourne councils to see who can record the most species in iNaturalist during Biodiversity month. By participating you'll learn about local plants and animals, be contributing to citizen science, creating real data that scientists and researchers can access and you'll also show the world the amazing flora and fauna found right across Cardinia.

Last year, in Cardinia 150 dedicated observers took pictures of over 2,186 plants and animals, identifying 682 unique species. This data helps scientists to identify any new wildlife as well as create baseline ecosystem data assisting with monitoring future biodiversity health.

The BioBlitz encourages residents to record local species throughout September using iNaturalist – a free app that helps you identify the plants and animals around you. So grab your camera and get out into nature.

Cardinia Shire Mayor Councillor Jack Kowarzik is excited about the BioBlitz challenge and the value it brings.

"Participating in the Biodiversity Blitz is a fantastic way to connect with nature and contribute to important scientific research. Every observation helps scientists understand and protect our local environment,"

Mayor Kowarzik said. "Across Cardinia there are so many incredible places to see such a diverse range of animals and plants that you'll be spoilt for choice for where to head." he added.

То become а Bioblitz observer, simply download the free iNaturalist App and sign up to the Biodiversity Blitz 2024 - Cardinia Shire Then project. throughout September record your observations. Don't worry if you can't



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identify the plant or animal, the app can help you identify your observation, alongside a helpful friendly community. Take care when moving around taking images; use designated paths so you don't step on plants or snakes and never disturb nesting birds. If you see young birds on the ground, they are likely to be fledglings so please leave them. If you see an animal in need of help, contact wildlifevictoria.org.au

To help prepare you for the BioBlitz, join the free iNaturalist Community Champions Webinar on Tuesday 27 August from 7pm to 8pm. 
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A new policy to support women and girls in sport

Cardinia Shire Council have adopted a new Fair Access Policy and Fair Access Action Plan to promote and support the participation of women and girls in sport and active recreation within Cardinia.

This new policy establishes a consistent framework to advance inclusivity and provide equitable access to sport and recreation opportunities for women and girls, ensuring fairness for all community members.

The Fair Access Policy strives to enhance and effectively manage Cardinia's sports and active recreation facilities, creating opportunities to strengthen women's and girls' participation.

Community consultation on the draft Fair Access Policy and Action Plan was undertaken from 25 June to 14 July 2024 to ensure the policy effectively meets the needs of women and girls in sport and active recreation. Community feedback helped shape the final policy.

The new Fair Access Policy, accompanied by the Fair Access Action Plan, reflects Council's commitment to creating an inclusive and accessible community sports sector.

The adoption of this policy and action plan is a significant step in ensuring that sporting spaces are welcoming and accommodating for all community members.

Equestrian Strategy adopted

Cardinia Shire Council has adopted its Equestrian Strategy 2024–2034 to guide equestrian activities in the shire into the future.

Equestrian is a popular activity in Cardinia Shire with approximately 1,000 equestrian club participants and more than 20 clubs operating, in addition to informal trail users.

The Equestrian Strategy 2024–2034 sets the strategic framework for equestrian in Cardinia Shire. It includes a vision, objectives, and an implementation plan to ensure Council has a clear strategic direction for the provision of equestrian facilities and how Council can continue to support the equestrian community over the next 10 years.

Development of the new strategy was undertaken following a review of the 2014 Equestrian Strategy. As part of the review, two rounds of community consultation were undertaken, and feedback received has helped to inform the development of the new strategy.

Council listened to what was important to the community, what improvements they wanted to see, and how Council can better support the equestrian community. Council is grateful for the community's input, which has helped to shape the vision and objectives of the new strategy.

Key changes to the strategy include a greater focus on:

- Improving safety, education and awareness for equestrians, shared trail users and motorists.
- Partnerships that support activations, events and infrastructure.
- Increased participation through improved access to public reserves.

The Equestrian Strategy 2024–2034 aims to ensure that Council can continue to address the needs of its equestrian community alongside its changing demographic and geographic landscape. It ensures Council has a clear direction for the provision of equestrian trails and facilities and how Council can continue to support our equestrian community over the next 10 years.



Early Swamp Schools

By Heather Arnold, on behalf of the Koo Wee Rup Swamp Historical Society The first school on the Koo Wee Rup Swamp was School No. 2629 which had opened on November 1, 1884 on the corner

of Bethunes Road and the Koo Wee Rup to Bayles Road. It was originally known as Yallock School and changed its name to Koo Wee Rup on July 24, 1903. The building was shifted into Rossiter Road (where the Secondary College is) in September 1910. A new building was opened in February 1915 which burnt down in May 1950. The replacement school opened as a Higher Elementary School (both primary and some secondary classes) in mid 1952. The Primary school eventually moved to its Moody Street location and was officially opened there on November 25, 1960.

For many years this was the only school on the Swamp. After four years of work the newly drained Swamp was considered ready for settlement in 1893 and families began to arrive, however it wasn't until July 1894 that the schools at Five Mile and Iona opened.

It must have been a great occasion for the swamp settlers at the eastern end of the swamp to have schools that their children could attend, however

apparently some children were less than excited as they had been roaming free and attending not school for 12 months and a newspaper report at the time said that the Iona Head Teacher, Arthur Jamieson. 'found the that the children were in a deplorable condition of ignorance and barbaric wildness.'

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

The first of these schools to open was No. 3198, just down from Five Mile Road on the Main Drain, and it opened on July 7, 1894. This School was originally called Koo Wee Rup South and changed its name to Koo Wee Rup North (and unofficially called Five Mile School). When the Iona School, No, 3201, opened two days later on July 9, 1894, on the corner of Thirteen Mile Road and Bunyip River Road, it was called Koo Wee Rup North; in 1899 it changed its name to Bunyip South and then in 1905 to Iona. Five Mile School had Peter Norris as the first Head Teacher. At one time the school population was over 100 but in July 1954 when the School celebrated its 60th anniversary there were only 20 children enrolled. However, the anniversary celebrations were a great success

with over 700 people attending, including three

original scholars - W. Gilchrist, W.G. De Vries and Tilly Freeman (nee O'Shea). The school parents voted for the school to close in November 1959 and the children were sent to Pakenham Consolidated School. Five Mile was the last school to join or 'consolidate' with the Consolidated School which had officially opened in May 1951.

When the Iona school opened on July 9, 1894 it had 83 pupils, which by 1895 had grown to 120 pupils. When the new Head Teacher Joseph Lyons arrived in April 1895 he had three assistants - Mr Colquhoun, Miss Alston and Mrs Lyons. Joseph Lyons remained at the school until 1907. The Teachers Residence was built in 1908; previous to this the Head Teacher had to

live in Garfield. The original school building burnt down on July 6, 1913 and the new building opened on April 28, 1914 with 164 pupils.

In 1942, electricity was supplied to the school and the telephone was connected in 1964. Celebrations took place in 1964 to mark the 50th anniversary of the new building with

between 500 and 600 people attending. Another celebration took place in 1989 to mark the 75th anniversary the 1914 building. Sadly, the school community could not celebrate one hundred years of education as the school was closed on December 17, 1993, seven months short of its centenary.

The Koo Wee Rup Swamp Historical Society meets on the second Wednesday of each month at Mallow house, 325 Rossiter Road, corner of Henry Street. The next meeting is on September 11, 2024 at 7.30pm. New members welcome. The Museum is generally open on the 2nd and 4th Sundays
